Dr. Laís Landim Gomes is a tenure-track Assistant Professor in Endodontics at the College of Dentistry, University of Saskatchewan, where she coordinates preclinical and clinical endodontic courses. She holds a DDS degree, an MSc in Endodontics, a PhD in Prosthodontics & Dental Materials from São Paulo State University (UNESP), Brazil, and a clinical specialty in Endodontics from the University of São Paulo (USP), Brazil. Her research focuses on biomaterials for endodontic therapy, systemic diseases and endodontic outcomes, and oral rehabilitation of endodontically treated teeth. She completed a Postdoctoral Research Fellowship in Biomedical Engineering at McGill University, Canada, developing expertise in cardiovascular research and bioactive biomaterials. Her research has received awards and funding support. Dr. Gomes is a member of the Canadian Academy of Endodontics (CAE), American Association of Endodontists (AAE), Canadian Association for Dental Research (CADR), and the International Association for Dental, Oral and Craniofacial Research (IADR).

After obtaining her PhD degree, Dr. Gomes expanded her international research experience through collaborative projects in Canada and Brazil focused on endodontics, biomaterials, systemic diseases, and regenerative research. She completed a Postdoctoral Research Fellowship in the Department of Biomedical Engineering at McGill University, Canada, where she developed expertise in cardiovascular research and bioactive biomaterials. Currently, at the University of Saskatchewan, she maintains active collaborations with Canadian institutions and São Paulo State University (UNESP), Brazil. These partnerships have resulted in presentations at major international scientific meetings, including the IADR/AADOCR/CADR General Sessions and the Canadian Cardiovascular Congress, involving studies on systemic diseases and endodontic outcomes, antimicrobial therapies, cardiovascular research, and regenerative approaches in endodontics, with ongoing publication outcomes and international research dissemination.
